Prohibit extremist speakers and events in the school or college	The school or college exercises "due diligence" in relation to requests from external speakers and organisations using school premises.	- Request an outline of what the speaker intends to cover - Research the person/organisation to establish whether they have demonstrated extreme views/actions. - Deny permission for people/organisations to use school or college premises if they have links to extreme groups.
